Doing all we can to keep items out of landfills

In 2024, our Goodwill was able to keep 28,651,170 pounds of items out of local landfills through our thrift store sales, repurposing, recycling and reuse.

That's the equivalent weight of about 7,000 cars, which equals about 19 cars per day throughout the year.

Just two years later, Mason returned to Goodwill with a new goal—he wanted to see if he could become a cashier. His commitment to learning and growth led him to complete a two-week assessment at our Middleburg Heights store, where he impressed everyone with his performance. This success opened the door to our Job Development Program, where Mason worked on refining his resume, improving his interview skills and building confidence.

While initially shy, Mason's hard work paid off when he secured a job at the Strongsville store.

Today, he loves coming to work each day, working alongside his supportive coworkers at Goodwill.

Edgar J. Helms outstanding achiever of the year

After nearly a year of unemployment, Patrisha Anderson felt stuck. The loss of several close family members had left her grieving, and her confidence in her job skills had faded. She knew something needed to change—so she turned to Goodwill.

With the guidance of a dedicated job coach, Patrisha began to rebuild both her skillset and her selfesteem. Step by step, she regained the motivation she had lost and started to believe in her potential again.

Her persistence paid off. Patrisha landed a front desk role at the Glidden House—a position she proudly calls her "second home." "If I hadn't found Goodwill," she said, "I'd probably still be looking for a job."

Today, she's not just employed—she's empowered.

Achiever of the year

When Gavin Gorski first came to Goodwill, he had spent a decade housebound because of the challenges of living with autism. He was referred to us by Opportunities for Ohioans with Disabilities.

With the help of an employment specialist, Gavin worked on building job skills, identifying his personal goals and gaining confidence. He quickly adapted to different tasks, approaching each with a sense of play—often referring to the work as "making it a game."

One task he particularly enjoyed was stocking shelves, a job that sparked his interest in entering the workforce.

When the time came to apply, Gavin set his sights on Marc's in North Canton as a stocker—and, to no one's surprise, he was hired.

The transition from being socially isolated to having regular work and meaningful connections was life changing. Gavin is now thriving, happy in his job and cherishing the relationships he has formed with his coworkers.

Betty Thompson first came to Goodwill looking for a job. She was placed at a local laundromat, but when COVID hit, the business shut down, and Betty found herself back at square one. Referred again to Goodwill by the West Virginia Division of Rehabilitation Services, Betty was determined to find new opportunities, despite the challenges life had thrown her way.

During this time, Betty also faced personal losses, but she never let them hold her back. With the support of an employment specialist, Betty explored where she could find fulfillment and joy in her work. Eager to learn, she discovered that sorting clothing was a perfect fit for her skills and interests.

As Betty's training came to an end, her passion for the job was clear. She wanted to continue working at Goodwill, and when a sorter position opened up, Betty applied. It was no surprise to anyone that she landed the role and transitioned seamlessly from training to employment.

Today, Betty is thriving as a sorter at Goodwill. Her unwavering determination and motivation make her a natural at the job.



DIGITAL SKILLS TRAINING ON THE GO

In 2024, we unveiled our Mobile Tech Learning Lab, which brings digital skills training to the communities where it's needed most.

The trailer is outfitted with six computer stations and has a temperature-regulated interior. The trailer is positioned outside of our stores on a rotational basis with instructors on-site to offer digital skills training to employees and community members within our 10-county territory.
